Illumination System: Let There Be Light

Without a proper light source, magnification is useless. The illumination system ensures the specimen is well-lit for viewing.

- **Illuminator (Light Source):** Located in the base of modern microscopes, this built-in light shines upward through the diaphragm, condenser, stage, and specimen. Some older microscopes may use a mirror to reflect external light.
