Stun her with a Deku Seed (or slingshot if you have it) and then strike with your sword. This pattern repeats three times. Remember to break all the webs and pots for recovery hearts.

2. Dodongo's Cavern

After obtaining the Bomb Bag, you can finally access this fiery labyrinth. The key strategy here is efficient bomb usage. You need bombs to break cracked walls and stun Dodongos. For the boss, King Dodongo, wait for him to inhale and then toss a bomb into his mouth. When he is stunned, attack his tail. Avoid the rolling attack by sidestepping. Collect the Bomb Bag upgrade and the Goron Tunic for heat resistance.

3. Inside Jabu-Jabu's Belly

This dungeon is often considered the trickiest for Young Link because of the water current puzzles and the need to carry Princess Ruto. The primary strategy: use the Boomerang to stun enemies like the Big Octo and the Parasitic Tentacle. For the boss, Barinade, stun its heart by tossing the Boomerang, then attack the tentacle attachments. Repeat until all tentacles are gone, then strike the heart again. Don't forget the Zora Tunic for breathing underwater later.

Becoming an Adult: The Temples of Time

Once you pull the Master Sword and fast-forward seven years, Hyrule becomes far more dangerous. Enemies are tougher, and the puzzles require more critical thinking. Your new arsenal includes the Hookshot, Longshot, and powerful spells. **This Ocarina of Time Strategy Guide** now shifts focus to the six major temples, each demanding a unique approach.

4. Forest Temple

This spooky, twisted mansion is home to the Poe Sisters and Phantom Ganon. The main strategy: use the Fairy Bow to shoot the Poe Sisters'

paintings when they appear, and use the Hookshot to pull down block puzzles. For the boss, Phantom Ganon, he teleports between frames. Shoot him when he appears, then dodge his energy ball attacks. After three hits, he will come down for a sword fight. Stun him with arrows, then smack him with your sword. Repeat. Collect the Din's Fire spell here for crowd control.

5. Fire Temple

Fire and volcanic rock dominate this dungeon. The strategy revolves around using the Megaton Hammer to break cracked floors and defeat enemies like the Flare Dancer and Fire Keese. You'll need the Hover Boots for certain gap jumps. The boss, Volvagia, is a dragon that emerges from holes in the floor. Wait for it to extend its head, then smash it with the Megaton Hammer. Be ready to dodge falling rocks and flames. Remember the Goron Tunic is essential for heat resistance.

6. Water Temple

The infamous Water Temple often frustrates players due to its water level puzzles. The strategy: constantly check your map and change the water level using the three switches hidden around the temple. The dungeon's design is layered; you must raise and lower the water to access new areas. Use the Hookshot to cross gaps and the Iron Boots to sink underwater. The boss, Morpha, is a giant aquatic amoeba. Wait for it to extend a tentacle, then use the Longshot to pull it out of the water, and attack the core with your sword. This is a fight of patience.

7. Shadow Temple

Darkness and traps define this eerie dungeon. Use the Lens of Truth to see invisible platforms and false walls. The Hover Boots allow you to walk over thin ledges. The strategy: defeat Death Hand (a giant hand that grabs you) and Bongo Bongo, the boss. Bongo Bongo is invisible at first; use the Lens of Truth to reveal its hands. Stun each hand with arrows, then use the Lens to see the eye on its body. Shoot it repeatedly. It will then charge at you. Use the Hover Boots to strafe and avoid its attacks.

8. Spirit Temple

This temple requires both Young Link and Adult Link, as you must travel back and forth in time using the Master Sword. The strategy: as Young Link, collect the Silver Gauntlets and the Mirror Shield. As Adult Link, use the Silver Gauntlets to push blocks and the Mirror Shield to reflect light onto sun switches. The boss, Twinrova, is a pair of witch sisters. Use the Mirror Shield to reflect their fire and ice attacks back at them. After a while, they fuse into Twinrova. For the final phase, reflect their spells with your shield to stun them, then strike with your sword. Do not let the spells hit you—they reverse elements and can one-shot you.

Upgrades and Collectibles: Becoming a True Hero

To make your journey easier, invest time in collecting key upgrades. This section of the **Ocarina of Time Strategy Guide** covers the most beneficial items that boost your power and survivability.

- **Quiver and Bomb Bag Upgrades:** Visit the Lost Woods and the Market to find the adult merchant selling upgrades. You can also defeat the Skulltula family ghosts across Hyrule to earn rewards like a larger quiver or increased wallet size.
- **Fairy Spells:** Din's Fire (obtained in the Great Deku Tree as adult), Farore's Wind (in the Water Temple), Nayru's Love (in the Desert Colossus). These spells are optional but extremely useful. Nayru's Love creates a temporary invincibility shield—essential for boss fights.
- **Heart Pieces:** There are 36 heart pieces scattered around Hyrule. Collect them all to maximize your health. Many are found by

completing mini-games (like the fishing pond, the horse race, or the bean salesman).

- **Bottle Items:** You can carry up to four bottles. Fill them with Fairies (from fountains), Potions (from shops), or Lon Lon Milk (from Malon's ranch). Fairies revive you automatically when you die—a lifesaver in tough dungeons.
- **Stone of Agony & Skulltula Tokens:** The Stone of Agony (requires the Rumble Pack or it's useless) alerts you to hidden caves. Collect 50 Gold Skulltulas to receive a plot tree that leads to a boss room, or just for bragging rights.

Mastering Combat: Tips for Every Enemy

Combat in Ocarina of Time is not just about button mashing. Each enemy has a weakness. Here are essential combat strategies that will help you conserve health and resources.

- **Stalfos:** These skeletal knights block most attacks. The best strategy: wait for them to attack, then sidestep and hit them from behind. Use the Megaton Hammer to stun them temporarily.
- **Lizalfos:** These reptilian warriors often appear in groups. Use the spin attack to hit multiple at once. Block their jumping attacks with your shield, then counter.
- **Like-Like:** This slimy creature sucks your shield off. Keep your distance and shoot it with arrows or use bombs. If you get caught, wiggle the analog stick rapidly to escape.
- **Wallmaster and Floormaster:** Giant hands that drop from ceilings or crawl on floors. Use Din's Fire to burn them or simply jump away. If caught, wait for the instant kill—they are faster than you think.

1. **Gohma (Deku Tree):** Stun eye with slingshot, then slash. Repeat.

Also, the Poes in the graveyard yield a Bottle and a Big Poes reward. Don't neglect the Mask Trading side quest: delivering masks to the children in the Lost Woods leads to a heart piece and the Mask of Truth.

General Tips and Final Advice
