What to Avoid Strictly

- Fried foods, fast food, or anything greasy
- Butter, margarine, lard, and oils (use minimal spray if cooking)
- Fatty meats like bacon, sausage, or marbled steak
- Whole milk, cream, cheese, and ice cream
- Nuts, seeds, nut butters, and avocado
- Caffeinated and carbonated beverages (can stimulate gut)

If you feel hungry between meals, increase portion size of low-fat items gradually. Keep a food diary to note any discomfort.

Weeks 3 to 6: Gradually Introducing Healthy Fats and Fiber

As your body adapts, you can slowly increase fat content and start adding fiber. The key is incremental change. Your **diet plan after gallbladder surgery** now evolves to include a wider variety, but still with caution. Aim for fat intake around 40-50 grams per day, spread across meals.

How to Add Fats Safely

- excessive caffeine and alcohol (can relax the sphincter of Oddi)
- Large meals with more than 15-20 grams of fat per serving

- **Breakfast**: 1 cup oatmeal made with skim milk, topped with 1/2 cup blueberries and 1 tablespoon chopped almonds. Small glass of water.

- **Lunch**: 4 ounces baked chicken breast with a side of steamed spinach and 1/2 cup brown rice. Apple slices for dessert.
