Every 3,000 to 5,000 Miles (or 3 to 6 Months)

Every 7,500 Miles (or 12 Months)

At this interval, you should perform all the 3,000-mile tasks plus the following:

- **Tire Rotation:** Rotate tires to ensure even tread wear. The recommended pattern for the 2008 Silverado is cross-rotation (left front to right rear, etc.). This extends tire life and maintains even traction.
- **Brake Inspection:** Check brake pads, rotors, and calipers for wear. Look at the brake lines for cracks or leaks. If you hear squealing or feel pulsation, service brakes immediately.

Every 15,000 Miles (or 24 Months)

- **Engine Air Filter Replacement:** Replace the engine air filter regardless of appearance. A clean filter improves horsepower and gas mileage, especially on the 5.3L and 6.0L V8 engines.
- **PCV Valve Inspection:** Check the Positive Crankcase Ventilation (PCV) valve for clogging. Replace if necessary to prevent oil leaks and sludge buildup.
- **Fuel Filter Replacement:** For gasoline engines, replace the fuel filter to protect injectors from debris. The 2008 Silverado fuel filter is located along the frame rail near the fuel tank.
- **Exhaust System Check:** Inspect the muffler, catalytic converter, and exhaust pipes for rust, holes, or loose hangers. A leaking exhaust can be dangerous.
- **Suspension and Steering:** Check tie rod ends, ball joints, and sway bar links for play. Listen for clunks over bumps.

Major Service Intervals at 30,000, 60,000, and 90,000 Miles

30,000 Miles (Major Service)

At this point, perform all previous tasks plus the following critical services:

- **Automatic Transmission Fluid and Filter Change:** For the 4L60E or 4L80E transmission, drain and replace the fluid and filter. Use Dexron-VI fluid. Severe service recommends this every 15,000 miles.
- **Transfer Case Fluid Change** (4WD models): Replace the transfer case fluid with the specified automatic transmission fluid or gear oil (check your manual).
- **Front and Rear Differential Fluid Change:** Replace gear oil in both differentials. For the G80 locking rear differential, use a limited-slip additive if specified.
- **Coolant System Service:** Drain and refill the engine coolant with Dex-Cool (or equivalent universal coolant). Replace the thermostat if original.
- **Spark Plug Replacement** (for V6 and V8 engines): The 2008 Silverado uses iridium-tipped spark plugs. Replace them every 30,000 miles under severe conditions or 100,000 miles for normal conditions. Check the gap on new plugs.
- **Brake Fluid Flush:** Replace brake fluid to prevent moisture absorption and internal corrosion.

60,000 Miles (Extended Service)

Repeating the 30,000-mile service is essential, along with these additions:

- **Timing Belt or Chain Inspection:** The 2008 Silverado uses a timing chain (on V8s) or belt (on V6). For belt engines, replace at 60,000 miles. For chain engines, inspect for stretch or wear.
- **Drive Belt Replacement:** Replace the serpentine belt even if it looks okay. A snapped belt can cause overheating and electrical failure.

- **Water Pump Inspection:** Check for weeping or play in the water pump bearing. Replace proactively if high mileage.
- **Steering Rack and Power Steering System:** Flush power steering fluid and inspect rack for leaks.
