- **Repetitive Patterns:** Great easy music often uses melodic patterns that repeat. This helps you learn the piece faster and reinforces finger movement and muscle memory. Repetition is a powerful learning tool.

Listen to Recordings

Before you even play a note, try to find a recording of the piece you are learning. This is especially easy for famous classical themes or folk songs. Listen to the melody, the rhythm, and the phrasing. Having the sound of the piece in your head will guide your fingers and help you play more musically from the very first attempt.

Recommended Pieces for the Absolute Beginner
