4. **Fill in the inner section.** Gently lift your eyelid by pulling your finger from your temple outward. This flattens the skin and makes it easier to draw along the inner lash line. Use the same short stroke technique to connect the middle to the inner corner.
5. **Smudge for softness.** If the line looks too harsh, use a small smudging brush or your fingertip to gently blur the edge. This creates a softer, more forgiving look while you are still learning **how to put on eyeliner**.

Advanced Technique: How To Put On Eyeliner with Liquid for a Sharp Wing

Once you are comfortable with a pencil, you can graduate to liquid liner for a more dramatic effect. The key here is patience and the right angle.

1. **Map your wing.** Use a small piece of tape or an angled brush to mark where you want your wing to go. An easy guideline is to imagine a line extending from the corner of your nose to the outer edge of your eyebrow. This creates a natural lift.
2. **Draw the wing first.** Start by drawing the outline of your wing from the outer corner of your eye upward toward the end of your eyebrow. Keep the tip of the liner flush against your skin for a crisp edge.
3. **Connect the wing to your lash line.** Draw a thin line from the tip of the wing inward along your upper lash line, staying as close to the lashes as possible. Use short, feathery strokes. Do not try to do it in one swoop.
4. **Fill in the triangle.** The area between the wing triangle and your lash line should be filled in completely. This creates a seamless transition from your natural eye shape to the extended wing.
5. **Perfect the inner corner.** With the remaining product on the tip of your brush, draw a very thin line along the inner half of your lash line. Liquid liner here should be barely visible; the focus remains on the outer wing.
6. **Let it dry.** Keep your eyes open and look straight ahead for 30 seconds to allow the liner to set completely. Blinking too soon can transfer the product to your lower lash line.

Adapting Your Technique for Different Eye Shapes

No two eyes are exactly alike, and knowing **how to put on eyeliner** in a way that flatters your specific eye shape is a game changer. A technique that looks amazing on almond eyes may not work as well on round or hooded eyes. Here is how to customize your approach.

Almond Eyes

Almond eyes are symmetrical and slightly upturned at the outer corners. You have the most flexibility with liner. Almost any style works, from a simple tightline to a dramatic cat eye. Feel free to experiment with different thicknesses and wing lengths.

Round Eyes

If you have round eyes, your goal is to elongate the shape. Focus your liner on the outer third of the upper lash line and extend it outward into a subtle wing. Avoid lining the entire upper lash line with a thick line, as this can make your eyes appear even rounder. A thin line on the inner half is sufficient.

Hooded Eyes

Hooded eyes have a fold of skin that droops over the crease, hiding part of the eyelid. When applying liner, keep the line as thin as possible on the lid itself. The wing needs to be drawn with your eye open and looking straight ahead. Instead of following the natural curve of your eye, draw the wing outward in a straight line from the outer corner. This creates the illusion of a lifted eye without the liner getting lost in the hood.

Monolid Eyes

Monolid eyes do not have a visible crease. The key is to create

dimension. Use a thicker line that gradually tapers at the inner corner. A soft, smudged liner or a gradient effect works beautifully. Winged liner can be very striking on monolids; just make sure the wing angles upward sharply to create a lifting effect.

Downturned Eyes

If the outer corners of your eyes point downward, you want to create an upward lift. Start your liner thin at the inner corner and gradually thicken it as you move outward. The wing should go up and out, not following the downward curve of your eye. Avoid lining the lower lash line heavily, as this pulls the eye down further.

Common Mistakes and How to Fix Them
