Redstone is abundant at deep levels, and lapis lazuli is useful for enchanting. Coal is everywhere near the surface. Build your nether portal at your base using obsidian and a flint and steel. Once inside, your first goal is to find a nether fortress to gather blaze rods and wither skeletons. Blaze rods are essential for brewing and for reaching the End. Be cautious of ghast fireballs, which can destroy your portal. Always mark your portal location with torches or distinctive blocks so you can find your way back.

The Ender Dragon is the final boss of Minecraft. To reach it, you need to find an End Portal in a stronghold, which is located deep underground. Use eyes of ender (crafted from blaze powder and ender pearls) to locate the stronghold. Once in the End, focus on destroying the healing crystals on top of obsidian pillars before attacking the dragon. Use a bow for the crystals and a sword for the dragon. Bring blocks to build bridges across the void, plenty of food, and slow falling potions. Defeating the dragon rewards you with a massive amount of experience and the iconic dragon egg.
