Original Retail Price vs. Current Market Value

The current market for this product is dominated by third-party sellers, online marketplaces like eBay or Amazon Marketplace, and software key resellers. - **New, Unopened Box Copies:** Finding a brand-new, sealed retail box is rare. These are often considered collectible or are old stock. Prices can range from \$150 to \$300, depending on the seller and the condition.

These keys may work initially but can be deactivated by Microsoft at any time, leaving you without working software and no recourse.

Condition and Completeness

A fully boxed product with original manuals, discs, and a genuine COA (Certificate of Authenticity) sticker will always be more expensive than a simple digital key. Collectors and businesses that require a physical audit trail for their software licenses often pay a premium for complete packages.

- **Cloud Service Limitations:** Outlook 2013 can connect to modern email services like Gmail and Outlook.com, but some features (like modern authentication and advanced mailbox settings) may not work reliably. You may encounter login prompts or be forced to enable less secure app access.
