Driving to the Blue Mountains: The Most Flexible Option

This road takes you directly through the heart of the mountains, passing towns like Penrith, Glenbrook, and Lapstone before reaching the main hub of Katoomba.

Route Details

The train from Sydney Central Station to Katoomba is a beloved option for budget-conscious travelers and those who want to relax and enjoy the scenery. The service is operated by NSW TrainLink and runs regularly throughout the day.

Route and Timings

Catch the Blue Mountains Line from Sydney Central. The journey takes about 2 hours to Katoomba, with stops at Parramatta, Penrith, Springwood, and other towns.
