Controversy and Condemnation by the Catholic Church

Despite his lifelong dedication as a Jesuit priest, **Pierre Teilhard De Chardin** faced severe opposition from the Catholic Church hierarchy. In the 1920s, the Church forbade him from teaching or publishing his philosophical works.
