Key episodes include the pilot, where they meet at Overeaters Anonymous, and "Mike's New Job" (episode 2), which sets up his career as a police officer. The season also introduces the hilarious dynamic between Molly's domineering mother Joyce and her gentle father Vincent (Louis Mustillo).

- **Episode 1 - "Pilot"**: Mike and Molly meet at an OA meeting and share an awkward but promising first date.
- **Episode 5 - "The First Date"**: After some hesitation, they go on their official first date, complete with a memorable run-in with Mike's ex-girlfriend.
- **Episode 13 - "Mike's Apartment"**: Mike's mother Peggy drops in unannounced, creating chaos and revealing family secrets.
- **Episode 24 - "Mo's Ma"**: The season finale deals with Joyce's health scare, bringing the family closer together.

Season 1 boasts 24 episodes and sets the tone for the series: heartfelt with a steady stream of laugh-out-loud moments. Melissa McCarthy's performance earned her the first of two Primetime Emmy Awards for Outstanding Lead Actress in a Comedy Series (she won in 2011 for this season).
