

How To Make Caramel From Condensed Milk

- For stovetop: A large pot, water, and the unopened can (or a jar).
- For oven: A baking dish, aluminum foil, and a larger pan for a water bath.
- For slow cooker: A slow cooker and a trivet or cloth to keep the can off the bottom.
- For pressure cooker/Instant Pot: A pressure cooker with a rack.
- General: Oven mitts, tongs, a can opener, and an airtight container for storage.

Method 1: Stovetop Method (Classic & Quickest)

The stovetop method is the most traditional way to learn **how to make caramel from condensed milk**. It can be done with the can fully submerged in water or by transferring the milk to a jar. The key is maintaining a gentle simmer to prevent the can from exploding.

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. **Remove the label** from the can of sweetened condensed milk. Make sure the can has no dents or damages.

3. **Fill the pot** with water until the can is submerged by at least 2 inches (5 cm).
4. **Bring to a boil** over medium-high heat, then reduce to a gentle simmer. Do not let the water boil vigorously, as this can cause the can to burst.
5. **Simmer** for 2 to 3 hours. For a lighter, pourable caramel, cook for 2 hours. For a thick, spreadable dulce de leche, cook for 3 hours.
6. **Monitor the water level** every 30 minutes. Add more boiling water as needed to keep the can fully submerged.
7. **Turn off the heat** and let the can cool completely in the water. This is crucial—do not try to open a hot can, as the caramel could erupt.
8. **Once cool**, remove the can, open it, and stir the caramel. If desired, mix in vanilla or salt.

Safety Note

Never let the water boil dry. If the can is not fully submerged, it can overheat and explode, causing serious injury. Always use a pot with high sides and check frequently.

Method 2: Oven-Baked Dulce de Leche

This method is perfect if you want a hands-off approach with a controlled temperature. Baking condensed milk caramel in a water bath produces a silky, even caramel without any risk of the can bursting.

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. **Preheat** your oven to 425°F (220°C).
2. **Pour the sweetened condensed milk** into a 9-inch (23 cm) pie dish or a small baking dish. Cover tightly with aluminum foil.

3. **Place the dish** inside a larger roasting pan. Pour hot water into the roasting pan so it reaches halfway up the sides of the dish.
4. **Bake** for 1.5 to 2 hours, checking halfway. Add more hot water if the water bath evaporates.
5. **Remove the foil** carefully. The caramel should be thick and golden brown. Whisk until smooth.
6. **Let cool slightly**; it will thicken as it cools. Store in a jar in the refrigerator.

Tips for Oven Method

- Use a shallow dish for faster, more even cooking.
- Stir halfway through for a consistent color.
- For a darker, more intense flavor, bake a little longer, but watch closely to avoid burning.

Method 3: Slow Cooker Method (Set and Forget)

If you own a slow cooker, you can make condensed milk caramel while you go about your day. The low, steady heat prevents any risk of scorching.

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. **Place the sealed can** of sweetened condensed milk in the slow cooker. Alternatively, pour the milk into a mason jar and seal it tightly (choose heat-safe jars).
2. **Fill the slow cooker** with water until the can (or jar) is fully covered.
3. **Cook on low** for 8 to 10 hours. Do not use the high setting.
4. **Turn off the slow cooker** and let the can cool completely in the water.
5. **Open and stir.** The caramel will be very dark and thick if cooked for 10 hours; for a lighter caramel, aim for 7–8 hours.

Why This Method Works

The slow cooker maintains a constant temperature just below boiling, which slowly concentrates and caramelizes the milk sugars. It is the most hands-off technique and yields a traditional dulce de leche taste.

Method 4: Instant Pot or Pressure Cooker (Fastest)

For those who want the deepest flavor in a fraction of the time, the pressure cooker is ideal. It mimics the stovetop method but uses pressure to reduce cooking time dramatically.

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. **Place a sealed can** of sweetened condensed milk on the trivet inside the Instant Pot.
2. **Add water** until the can is almost covered (usually 2–3 cups).
3. **Close the lid** and set the valve to sealing. Cook on high pressure for 40–45 minutes.
4. **Allow natural pressure release** for 15–20 minutes, then

manually release any remaining pressure.

5. **Carefully remove the can** with tongs. Let it cool completely before opening.

Advantages of Pressure Cooker Method

- Cook time is only 40 minutes (plus cooling).
- Color and flavor are consistent.
- Less water evaporation than stovetop.
