The 1.69-inch nut width (typically around 43mm) provides ample room for fingerstyle players while remaining comfortable for those accustomed to standard electric guitar spacing. The 20 frets are accessible, allowing for melodic exploration up the neck without sacrificing the instrument's classical dreadnought proportions.

Sound Profile and Playability

Balanced Tonal Characteristics

When you first strum the Guild D-125, the immediate impression is one of balanced authority. The solid spruce top delivers a crisp attack, while the mahogany body rounds out the edges, preventing the sound from becoming brittle. The bass response is present and thumping, characteristic of the dreadnought shape, but it never overwhelms the mids and highs.
