They should curve inward slightly as they reach the jawline. Next, refine the shape of the jaw. Instead of a flat rectangle, give it a slight curve. The chin should be somewhat pointed. Erase the sharp corners of your initial rectangle to create a more organic bone structure. The goal here is to create a human skull shape that looks natural, even though it will eventually be covered in flames. A common mistake when learning **how to draw Ghost Rider easy** is making the skull too wide. Ghost Rider's skull is typically elongated and menacing, so keep it tall and narrow.

Step 3: Adding the Eye Sockets and Nose Cavity

Ghost Rider's eye sockets are deep, empty, and intense. Using the horizontal guideline from earlier, draw two large, inverted triangles or teardrop shapes for the eyes. They should angle downwards towards the center of the face. Make them big enough to be expressive. The eyes are a key focal point of the character. Below the eyes, draw a small, inverted heart shape or a small triangle with rounded edges for the nose cavity. Keep it simple. Do not add too much detail here; the flames will eventually cover most of the upper skull. Step 4: Drawing the Teeth and Jawline

you approach it methodically. The mouth of a skull is a long, curved line across the face. Draw a horizontal curve where the mouth should be. Now, draw a series of small vertical lines crossing that curve. These represent the gaps between the teeth. You do not need to draw each tooth individually; just shading the gaps will create the illusion of teeth. Ghost Rider often has a wide, aggressive grin. To achieve this, make the curve of the mouth extend outward, almost to the edges of the skull. Draw a line for the top row of teeth and another for the bottom row. The bottom jaw is usually slightly narrower than the top. For an easy approach, simply draw zigzag lines between the two jaw lines. This will give you a jagged, dangerous smile that is perfect for the Spirit of Vengeance. Mastering this step is a major milestone in your journey to understand **how to draw Ghost Rider easy**.

Step 5: Creating the Iconic Flames

Here is where the magic happens. The flames are what separate Ghost Rider from a simple skeleton. To draw the flames easily, think of them as large, sweeping curves that rise from the skull. Start by drawing a vertical line down from the chin for the neck. Draw a simple cylinder shape for the neck. Next, draw the shoulders. They should be broad and slightly hunched to give a menacing posture. Use a rounded rectangle or a trapezoid for the torso. Draw the arms hanging down or crossed. For an easy pose, have him standing straight with his arms slightly away from his body. The jacket should have a collar that stands up behind the skull. Draw a few lines to indicate the seams of the leather jacket. Keep the body relatively simple. The focus of this drawing should remain on the flaming skull. A common mistake when learning **how to draw Ghost Rider easy** is overcomplicating the body. Stick to basic human anatomy shapes.

Step 7: Adding the Hellfire Chain

No Ghost Rider drawing is complete without his signature chain. Drawing a chain might seem challenging, but it can be simplified. Instead of drawing every single link, draw a series of interlocking ovals or a thick, jagged line. Start from the hand or the shoulder and let the chain drape down. You can draw a few large loops. If you want it to look like it is on fire,

add small flames along the length of the chain. The chain should have a heavy, metallic feel to it. Use shading to create depth on the links. If you are using ink, you can simply outline the loops and leave the inside white. The chain is a great way to add dynamic movement to your drawing. It leads the eye around the composition. When looking for **how to draw Ghost Rider easy**, remember that the chain does not have to be perfect. A rough, aggressive style suits the character very well.

Step 8: Refining and Shading

This is the stage where your drawing comes to life. Go over your pencil lines with a darker pencil or an ink pen. Define the jawline, the teeth, and the eye sockets. Shade the inside of the eye sockets and the nose cavity deeply. This dark contrast will make the flames pop visually. Use cross-hatching or simple smudging to shade the cheekbones and the jaw. The skull should look three-dimensional. Shade the leather jacket with dark, heavy lines. Leather is shiny, so leave a few white highlights on the shoulders and arms. For the flames, leave the core white or yellow and use darker orange or red around the edges. This creates a glowing effect.
