- **Use a Metronome:** Many Star Wars themes have strict march rhythms (e.g., **The Imperial March** is at around 100-108 bpm). Practice with a metronome to lock in the tempo, then gradually add expression.
- **Listen to the Original Recordings:** This is the most important tip. Listen to how the trumpet section plays alongside the full orchestra. Notice intonation, style, and blend. Try to emulate the sound of the Hollywood studio trumpeters.
