Types of Guided Deer Hunts in Mississippi

For the rut, which peaks in late October through early November in the northern part of the state, archery can be exceptionally thrilling. Rifle Hunts

The general gun season in Mississippi runs from mid-November through early January, with the rut usually in full swing during the first few weeks. Rifle hunts are by far the most popular guided

Top Regions for Guided Deer Hunts in Mississippi

The Mississippi Delta

The Delta, often called the "Buck Capital of the South," is famous for producing giant deer with heavy racks and large body sizes. The rich alluvial soil supports abundant agriculture (soybeans, corn, cotton) that fuels antler growth. Guided operations in the Delta typically hunt along levee systems, bottomland hardwoods, and agricultural fields. Expect to see many 140-170 inch bucks, and sometimes even larger. If you are looking for a true trophy, a Delta guided hunt is hard to beat.

North Mississippi Hill Country

North Mississippi features rolling hills, mixed pine and hardwood forests, and creek bottoms. While deer here are generally smaller in body size compared to the Delta, the genetics can still produce large antlers. Guided hunts in this region often involve still-hunting or stand placement on ridges and near water sources. The terrain is more

challenging to access, but the experience is more traditional and woody.

Central and South Mississippi

Central Mississippi, including areas around Jackson and the Bienville National Forest, offers a mix of public and private land guided opportunities. South Mississippi, with its longleaf pine savannas and river floodplains, has a longer growing season and can produce surprisingly big bucks. Some guides here focus on lowland swamps and river breaks, offering a unique adventure for hunters who enjoy more rugged terrain.

Costs and Packages for Guided Deer Hunts in Mississippi

Prices vary widely based on the length of the hunt, the quality of the property, and the season. A three-day guided rifle hunt on a good property might range from **\$1,500 to \$4,500**. Trophy packages on premier Delta farms can exceed \$5,000. Archery hunts are sometimes slightly less expensive, but they also tend to be longer (4-5 days) to increase opportunity. "Management" or doe hunts can be as low as \$500-\$800. Always factor in travel, license fees, tips for guides (10-15% of hunt cost is standard), and meat processing if not included.

When comparing packages, focus on value rather than just price. A slightly more expensive hunt on a well-managed property with low hunting pressure is often a better investment than a cheap hunt on overhunted land.

How to Prepare for Your Guided Mississippi Deer Hunt

Gear and Clothing

Mississippi weather can be unpredictable. Late

October can be warm (70°F), while December mornings can dip into the 20s. Layering is essential. Bring lightweight base layers, a mid-layer, and a windproof outer layer. Quality boots that are comfortable for long sits and waterproof for wet conditions are a must. Don't forget a rain suit—Mississippi rain can arrive suddenly. Optics: a good pair of binoculars and a rangefinder. Your guide will likely provide a shooting rest or a window rest in the blind, but a bipod or shooting stick is a good backup.

Licenses and Regulations

Non-resident hunters must purchase a Mississippi hunting license. As of 2025, a non-resident all-game hunting license costs around \$300, and a deer permit is additional (approximately \$200). Some guided hunts include a license, but most do not. Check the current Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MDWFP) regulations. Additionally, you may need to take a hunter education course if you were born after a certain year (usually 1972). Ensure you have proof of certification.

Physical Preparation

While guided hunts often involve minimal walking (you are driven to the stand), you should still be fit enough to climb into an elevated stand or walk a short distance if needed. During recovery of a deer, you may need to drag or help load the animal. Light cardio and stretching in the weeks before your hunt will help you enjoy the experience more.

Conservation and Ethics in Guided Deer Hunts

Mississippi has a storied deer management history.

The state has implemented restrictive buck limits (one buck per day, but only one of those may be 10 points or better in some zones) in certain areas to protect younger bucks. Many guided operations voluntarily adhere to strict antler restrictions (e.g., minimum 140-inch class) to promote herd health. By booking a responsible guide, you are supporting conservation efforts and sustainable hunting practices. Ethical hunters take clean shots, respect game, and follow all laws. Good guides will reinforce these values.

The Role of the Guide in Conservation

Afterward, the guide will come pick you up. If a deer is harvested, the guide will assist with a quick recovery and field dressing, then take the deer to a processor if arranged.
