This is a great song to practice holding a chord for several beats before switching. The famous chorus is a joy to play once you get the hang of it.

6. I Shall Be Released

Originally recorded by The Band, but written by Dylan, this song uses a simple I-IV-V progression in the key of C. Chords: **C, F, and G**. The open chords ring beautifully, and the song has a gospel-like simplicity. The strumming is very straightforward—downstrokes on the beat work well. It is a great song for learning to build emotional intensity through simple repetition.

7. Like a Rolling Stone (Beginner Approach)

Yes, this song is famously long and complex, but you can play a stripped-down version using just **C, F, and G**. Skip the organ fills and focus on the chords. The chorus is a simple three-chord loop: C, F, G. Play it with a strong downstroke strum to mimic the driving beat. It is a fantastic challenge for a beginner who wants to tackle a legend.

Tuning and Capo Tips for Dylan Songs

Many of Dylan's recordings use alternate tunings, particularly drop D (D-A-D-G-B-E) and open tunings. However, for these easy Bob Dylan guitar songs, standard tuning is perfectly fine. If you want to match the original key exactly, a **capo** is your best friend. For example:
