At first glance, a German electronic band known for cosmic space music might seem like an odd fit for a coming-of-age comedy about a suburban teenager starting a brothel in his parents' home. Yet, the **Tangerine Dream Risky Business soundtrack** works perfectly because it treats the material with a seriousness that the character himself feels. To Joel Goodson, his decisions are not just teenage pranks; they are life-and-death struggles for his future. The sweeping, dramatic electronic score elevates his mundane anxieties to epic proportions.

Paul Brickman, the director, was a fan of using existing music to create ironic contrasts. He initially envisioned the entire film using only popular songs. However, he realized he needed a connective tissue—a musical narrative that could bridge the gap between scenes and sustain the film's unique tone. Tangerine Dream provided that connective tissue. Key Tracks and Their Narrative Function

"Risky Business (The Main Theme)"

This darker, more aggressive piece emerges during the film's second half. As the stakes rise—the Porsche is stolen, the household is trashed, the Princeton interview is looming—the music becomes more percussive and frantic. This theme represents the

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consequence of the "risky" path. It is the sound of chaos closing in, a direct contrast to the open, airy soundscapes of the first act.

The Missing Songs: The Controversy of the Commercial Soundtrack

A major point of confusion for fans is the difference between the **Tangerine Dream Risky Business soundtrack** (the film score) and the commercial soundtrack album released by Virgin Records. The commercial album was a hybrid. It contained the hit songs from the film—including Bob Seger's "Old Time Rock and Roll," Phil Collins' "In the Air Tonight," and Journey's "After the Fall"—alongside a severely truncated selection of Tangerine Dream's score.

This led to a lasting frustration for soundtrack collectors. The beautiful, immersive score that plays so prominently in the film was not fully available on an official release for decades. Many of the best ambient sequences and connecting pieces were simply left off the commercial album. It was not until later remastered and expanded editions that fans got a more complete picture of the **Tangerine Dream Risky Business soundtrack** in

its intended form.

Beat the Heat: The Iconic Scene

Influence and Legacy of the Soundtrack

The **Tangerine Dream Risky Business soundtrack** cast a long shadow over the film scores of the late 1980s. It demonstrated that a purely electronic score could be commercially viable, emotionally rich, and narratively complex without a single orchestral

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instrument. It paved the way for other synth-heavy scores, such as Harold Faltermeyer's *Beverly Hills Cop* and Jan Hammer's *Miami Vice* work.

The "Cold Suburb" Aesthetic

The score is also a key component of the "Cold Suburb" aesthetic that defines the film. The music never gets too funky or too warm. It maintains a cerebral distance. While many of the pop songs from the film are time-stamped artifacts of the early 80s, Tangerine Dream's score sounds modern. This is because their music is based on texture and repetition, not on specific drum machines or synth presets that sound dated. The minimalist, hypnotic quality of "Love on a Real Train" could easily be mistaken for a track by a modern electronic act like Tycho or Boards of Canada.
