The film follows four socially inept friends on a holiday to Malia, Greece, hoping to lose their virginity and have the "best summer ever."

The humor is cruder and more explicit than "Angus, Thongs...", but the core emotion is identical: the acute embarrassment of being a teenager. The characters are constantly humiliated by their parents, their own stupidity, and their desperate attempts to be cool. If you loved Georgia’s cringe-inducing interactions with her family, you will love the disastrous holiday antics of Will, Simon, Jay, and Neil. It is a raw, unfiltered look at British teen life.

Tamara Drewe (2010)

For a slightly more grown-up option that still retains the quirky British village charm, **Tamara Drewe** is an excellent choice. Also directed by Stephen Frears, this film is set in the idyllic English countryside and revolves around a tabloid journalist who returns to her childhood home and causes a stir among the locals.

Thematic parallels include the pining for a perfect romance, the interference of busybody adults, and the beauty of a rural setting. While not a teen film per se, its blend of comedy, romance, and cringe-worthy social situations will appeal to fans of the gentle humor found in **movies like Angus Thongs And Perfect Snogging**.

Coming-of-Age Rom-Coms with Awkward Female Leads

The Edge of Seventeen (2016)

The similarities are striking. Both films center on a protagonist with a vivid fantasy life. Both feature a close-knit sisterhood (Georgia has Libby; Lara Jean has Margot and Kitty). Both involve a complicated love triangle. The tone is sweet, funny, and full of heart. The "fake dating" trope is executed perfectly, and the film perfectly captures the fluttery feeling of a first real romance. The Pacific Northwest setting of this film offers a slightly different aesthetic, but the emotional core is identical to the British seaside charm of Hastings.

The Half of It (2020)

This Netflix film takes a more introspective and artistic approach to the teen romance formula. Ellie Chu, a shy, intelligent student, is hired by a jock to write love letters to the popular girl he likes. Ellie herself is secretly in love with the same girl.

While this film has a more melancholic tone than the boisterous "Angus, Thongs...", it shares a deep understanding of the pain of unrequited love and the beauty of platonic friendship. The protagonist is an outsider who uses her creativity to navigate social situations. The film is a beautiful exploration of identity, loneliness, and the courage to be seen. For fans who appreciated the quieter, more tender moments in the Georgia Nicolson saga, **The Half of It** is a perfect fit.

They bicker, they lie to each other, and they ultimately have each other's backs. The film is incredibly funny, with a rapid-fire wit that rivals Georgia’s internal monologue. If you loved the scenes where Georgia and Jas try to figure out boy problems, or when they spy on the "Sex God" at the party, **Booksmart** will feel like coming home.

Easy A (2010)

Starring Emma Stone, **Easy A** is a sharp, witty, and meta take on high school reputation. After a lie spins out of control, Olive Penderghast pretends to be promiscuous, setting off a chain reaction of gossip and hilarious consequences.

The film is loaded with clever references to classic literature (The Scarlet Letter) and 80s teen movies. Olive is a fantastic protagonist – she is smart, sarcastic, and self-aware, much like Georgia. The film also features a strong friendship subplot and a wonderfully supportive family. The humor is quick, the costumes are iconic, and the romance with “Woodchuck Todd” is incredibly sweet. This is easily one of the best modern teen comedies and a perfect match for fans of **movies like Angus Thongs And Perfect Snogging**.

Mean Girls (2004)

It is impossible to discuss teen comedies without mentioning the queen of them all. **Mean Girls** is the gold standard for films about high school social hierarchies. Cady Heron, a homeschooled teenager, enters the jungle of public school and is adopted by the "Art Freaks" before infiltrating the "Plastics."

The connection here is the obsession with social standing, the importance of a good friend group, and the hilarious, cringe-worthy moments of trying to fit in. While "Mean Girls" is set in an American high school and is more focused on social warfare, the core theme of navigating the treacherous waters of teenage relationships is identical. Quirky Indie Films with a Similar Vibe

Juno (2007)

This Oscar-winning film is the ultimate in quirky, sharp-tongued teen protagonists. The dialogue is incredibly stylized and witty, often resembling the fast-paced inner voice of Georgia Nicolson.

The film is about making mature decisions while still being a kid. Juno’s relationship with her best friend Leah is reminiscent of Georgia and Jas. Her awkward interactions with the baby’s father, Paulie Bleeker, are wonderfully cringe-inducing and sweet. The soundtrack is iconic, and the film balances heavy topics with lighthearted humor perfectly.
