1. Preparing the Coat

4. Attaching the Nameplate and Unit Crests

5. Ribbons and Medals: The Order of Precedence

The highest badge is worn alone or at the top of a stack. Multiple badges are stacked in order of precedence, usually high to low. Special skills tabs like the Ranger Tab or Special Forces Tab are worn on the left shoulder loop, above the unit patch. 7. Setting Up the Trousers and Belt

The light blue or white long-sleeve shirt should be tucked in neatly. The collar should be snug but comfortable. The black necktie is fastened with a simple knot, such as a four-in-hand, and the tip should reach the top of the belt buckle. The beret is the most common headgear for the ASU. It should be worn with the flash centered over the left eye and the edge of the beret pulled down to the right ear. The excess material is tucked neatly above the flash. The service cap and flight cap are alternative headgear options authorized for specific occasions.

Common Mistakes in ASU Setup
