Before purchasing any animal, you must assess your experience level. It is strongly recommended that you do not acquire a green tree python as a

pet if you are a first-time snake owner. Here is why:

- **Temperament:** Green tree pythons are known for being defensive and nippy. While captive-bred individuals are calmer than wild-caught ones, they are still high-strung. They do not enjoy handling and will often bite out of fear or stress.
- **Specific Husbandry:** They require very precise temperature and humidity levels. Mistakes in husbandry often lead to respiratory infections, scale rot, or regurgitation.

- **Feeding Challenges:**

Juveniles can be notoriously picky eaters and may require specialized techniques like scenting or braining prey items.

- **Cost:** The initial setup for a green tree python is considerably more expensive than for a ball python or corn snake, primarily due to the need for a tall, well-ventilated enclosure with advanced misting systems.

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Enclosure

Setting up the correct habitat is the single most important factor in successfully keeping a green tree python as a pet. Remember, these are arboreal animals. They need height, not necessarily floor space.

Enclosure Size and Type

For an adult green tree python, the minimum recommended enclosure size is 24 inches long, 24 inches deep, and 36 to 48 inches tall (60cm x 60cm x 90-120cm). PVC enclosures

or front-opening glass terrariums are preferred over screen cages because they hold humidity much better. Screen cages can be used in very humid climates, but in most homes, they will cause the enclosure to dry out too quickly.

Temperature Gradient

Like all reptiles, green tree pythons require a thermal gradient to regulate their body temperature. You must provide a basking spot and a cool side.

- **Basking Spot:** 88-90°F (31-32°C) – This should be a warm branch located high in

the enclosure.

- **Ambient Warm Side:** 82-85°F (28-29°C).
- **Cool Side:** 75-78°F (24-25°C).
- **Nighttime Drop:** A slight drop to 70-75°F (21-24°C) is acceptable and even beneficial.

Heating Methods: Use a radiant heat panel (RHP) or a ceramic heat emitter (CHE) connected to a thermostat. Never use heat rocks, as they cause severe burns. Overhead heating is best because it mimics the sun and allows the snake to warm its dorsal surface.

Humidity and Hydration

This is where many keepers fail. A green tree python needs humidity levels between 50% and 70%, with spikes to 90-100% after misting. Low humidity leads to dehydration and stuck sheds, while constant high humidity without ventilation causes scale rot and bacterial infections.

Best Practices for Humidity:

1. Use a quality hygrometer to monitor levels daily.
2. Mist the enclosure heavily once or twice a day. An automatic misting system (like MistKing)

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is highly recommended for consistency.

3. Provide a large water bowl. Not only does this provide drinking water, but evaporation from the bowl also helps maintain ambient humidity.
4. Use a substrate that holds moisture without becoming waterlogged, such as cypress mulch, orchid bark, or a bioactive soil mix. Avoid aspen or paper towels for long-term housing.

Perches and Foliage

Without proper perches, a green tree

python will be stressed and may develop health issues. You must provide multiple horizontal branches of varying thicknesses (from finger-thick to wrist-thick) placed at different heights across the enclosure. These branches should be sturdy and secure. Many keepers use PVC pipes wrapped in cork bark or natural grapevine wood.

Foliage is equally important. Green tree pythons are ambush predators that feel secure when hidden. Use dense artificial or live plants (like pothos or snake plants) to create hiding spots. A stressed snake is a sick snake, so providing ample cover

reduces stress significantly.

Feeding Your Green Tree Python

Feeding is a topic of great importance when discussing the green tree python as a pet. Their diet in captivity consists entirely of appropriately sized rodents.

Prey Size and Schedule

- **Hatchlings (0-6 months):**
Hoppers or fuzzy mice (1-2 per week). Hatchlings can be challenging; some will only

accept scenting or live prey initially.

- **Juveniles (6-18 months):**
Adult mice or small rats (every 7-10 days).
- **Adults (18+ months):**
Medium to large rats (one appropriately sized prey item every 10-14 days). Overfeeding is a major problem in captivity. A healthy green tree python has a diamond-shaped body, not a round one.

Frozen vs. Live Prey

It is always safer and more ethical to feed frozen-thawed rodents. Live

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prey can injure or kill your snake by biting and scratching. Almost all captive-bred green tree pythons can be transitioned to frozen-thawed food with patience. If you acquire a picky feeder, try techniques such as braining (piercing the skull of the rodent to release scent) or dipping the rodent in chicken broth.

Feeding Method

Green tree pythons are arboreal. They prefer to take prey from a perch rather than from the ground. Using long forceps, dangle the thawed rodent in front of the snake while it is sitting on its branch. This mimics

their natural hunting behavior and stimulates a feeding response. Never leave a dead rodent in the enclosure if the snake refuses it, as it will rot quickly in the humid environment.

Handling and Temperament

If you are looking for a snake to handle frequently, a green tree python is likely not the best choice. These snakes are primarily display animals. They tolerate handling only very briefly and often show signs of stress, such as hissing, striking, or coiling into a tight defensive ball.

How to Handle Safely

1. Move slowly and deliberately. Fast movements trigger their feeding or defensive instincts.
2. Support the snake's body fully. Never grab them; instead, gently scoop them from underneath.
3. Keep handling sessions very short (5-10 minutes maximum) and infrequent (once a week or less).
4. Never handle a green tree python when it is in blue (about to shed) or after it has eaten (wait at least 48-72 hours).

Important Safety Note: While their bite is not venomous, green tree pythons have exceptionally long, sharp teeth. A bite can be painful and bloody. They often hold on and chew. Remain calm; running water or a drop of alcohol on their nose usually encourages them to release. Always wash the wound thoroughly.

Common Health Issues

Keeping a green tree python as a pet comes with specific health risks. Being proactive is the best medicine.

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- **Respiratory Infections (RI):** Caused by low temperatures or excessive humidity. Symptoms include open-mouth breathing, wheezing, and bubbles of mucus. This is a veterinary emergency.
- **Stuck Shed:** Almost always due to low humidity. Soaking the snake in a shallow, lukewarm bath and providing a humid hide can help. Never peel stuck shed off with your fingers.
- **Scale Rot:** Caused by wet, dirty substrate. Prevent by spot-cleaning daily and using a well-draining substrate.
- **Regurgitation:** Usually caused by handling the snake too soon after feeding, or by the temperature being too low to allow digestion. Do not feed for 10-14 days after a regurgitation.
- **Obesity & Hepatic Lipidosis:** A common killer of pet green tree pythons. Feed less frequently, and do not power-feed. An obese snake has a round, bulging body and a thick neck.

Your Green Tree Python

If you have decided that you can meet the challenges of keeping a green tree python as a pet, the next step is sourcing your animal responsibly. **Never** buy a wild-caught (WC) green tree python. WC animals are almost always heavily parasitized, dehydrated, and extremely stressed. They rarely adapt to captivity and often die.

Only purchase captive-bred (CB) animals from reputable breeders. A

quality, captive-bred green tree python will be:

- Feeding consistently on frozen-thawed rodents.
- Free of mites, ticks, and visible injuries.
- Alert with clear eyes and a clean vent.
- Properly identified by locality (e.g., Aru, Biak, Sorong, Manokwari). Different localities have different adult colors and temperaments.
