- **On the large beads (the “decade” prayers):** Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.
- **On the ten small beads (each decade):** For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.
- **Concluding prayer:** Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world. (Repeat three times.)

This Divine Mercy Prayer in English is usually recited at 3:00 PM, known as the Hour of Great Mercy, but it can be prayed at any time.
