

How To Write An Address On An Envelope

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Mastering the Art of Addressing an Envelope

These rules help automated sorting machines read addresses quickly and accurately. Even small mistakes—such as placing the address too far to the left or forgetting a comma—can lead to misrouting. The Anatomy of an Envelope Address

Every envelope has two key areas: the **delivery address** (the recipient's address) and the **return address** (the sender's address). Understanding where each goes and how to format them is the foundation of proper envelope addressing.

Positioning on the Envelope

The delivery address should be placed in the center of the envelope, approximately halfway down from the top and centered horizontally. This leaves enough room for the return

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address in the top-left corner and readers (OCBs) scan the text more reliably. While handwritten letters can use mixed case, typed addresses will benefit from all caps. For example:

postage in the top-right corner. For standard #10 business envelopes (4.125 x 9.5 inches), the delivery address typically starts about 2.5 inches from the left edge and 3 inches from the top edge. For smaller envelopes, adjust accordingly, but always keep the address clear of edges and folds.

Using All Caps

The USPS recommends using all capital letters for the entire address with no punctuation—except for the hyphen in ZIP+4 codes (e.g., 12345-6789). This style, known as **standardized addressing**, helps optical character

How To Write An Address On An Envelope: Step-by-Step

Step 1: The Recipient's Name

Start with the recipient's full name on the first line. For individual recipients,

use their title (Mr., Mrs., Ms., Dr., etc.) followed by first and last name. For a married couple, you can write “Mr. and Mrs. John Smith” or “Dr. Jane Smith and Mr. John Doe.” For families, use “The Smith Family” or simply list the parents’ names. In formal invitations, it is customary to spell out titles like “Doctor” or “Reverend.”

Step 2: The Street Address or PO Box

The second line contains the **street number and street name**. Always use numeric digits for the street number (e.g., 123 Main Street). Spell out directional prefixes like “North,” “South,” “East,” or “West” unless a

standard abbreviation is clearer (e.g., “N Main St”). For apartments or suites, include the unit number on the same line after the street address, separated by a comma or using “Apt.” For example: 123 Main Street, Apt 4B.

If the recipient uses a PO Box, write “PO Box [number]” instead of a street address. When both a street address and a PO Box are provided, always use the PO Box because mail is usually delivered there. Postal regulations dictate that a PO Box address should be used for all mail if the box is the official delivery point.

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Step 3: City, State, and ZIP Code

On the final line, write the **city**, followed by the two-letter state abbreviation (always capitalized, no periods), and the ZIP code. Use the ZIP+4 code whenever possible for faster delivery. For example: "NEW YORK NY 10001-2345." Leave a single space between the state abbreviation and the ZIP code. For US territories, use their official abbreviations (e.g., PR for Puerto Rico, VI for U.S. Virgin Islands).

address—goes in the top-left corner of the envelope. It should follow the same format as the delivery address but on fewer lines. Include your name or business name, street address, and city/state/ZIP. The return address is critical because if the mail cannot be delivered, the postal service will return it to you. Always include a return address, even on internal office mail or casual notes.

Addressing an Envelope to a Business

When mailing to a company or organization, the first line typically contains the recipient's name (if known) followed by the company name on the next line. For example:

MS JANE DOE
ACME CORPORATION
456 BUSINESS BLVD
CHICAGO IL 60601-1234

If you do not have a specific person, use "ATTN: [Department or Job Title]" as the first line. The USPS recommends placing "ATTN" at the beginning of the

delivery address line, not below the company name.

International Addresses

Writing international addresses requires including the **country name** on the last line, in all caps. Write the destination country's name in English (or the language of the destination if you prefer, but English is safest). The general format follows the same structure as domestic addressing but adapts to local conventions. For example:

Note that in many countries the postal code comes before the city. Be sure to research the correct format for the specific country. The Universal Postal Union provides guidelines, but your local post office can help.

Do not include the city or country name—the military postal system handles routing.

Military Addresses (APO/FPO)

For mail to military personnel overseas, use the service member's full name, unit number, and then APO (Army/Air Force Post Office) or FPO (Fleet Post Office) along with the appropriate state abbreviation (AA for Armed Forces Americas, AE for Armed Forces Europe, AP for Armed Forces Pacific). The ZIP

Common Mistakes to Avoid

- **Omitting the ZIP code:** Even if you think you know the city, the ZIP is vital for automated processing.
- **Using incorrect state abbreviations:** For example,

Handwritten vs. Printed

- **“CA” not “Cal” or “Calif”**
- **Placing the address too low or too far left:** The postal barcode and postage area need clear space.
- **Writing the return address on the back flap:** While accepted, it is less efficient; the top-left corner is standard.
- **Handwriting addresses on formal invitations:** Always use a legible script or printed labels for professional correspondence.
- **Forgetting the “APT” or “SUITE” number:** This causes delays or non-delivery.

Envelopes

Both methods are acceptable, but printed addresses (using a laser printer or label maker) tend to be more consistent and easier for scanners to read. If you handwrite, use a dark, bold pen (black or blue ink) and block letters. Avoid ornate cursive, as it can confuse machines. For formal occasions like weddings, calligraphy is popular but ensures the address is still clear; many calligraphers use a sans-serif style to maintain readability.

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Tips for Clear Handwriting

- Print all letters in uppercase for the address.
- Keep letters separate—do not connect them.
- Use a ruler to gently line the envelope if you struggle to write straight.
- Leave adequate space between lines (at least 1/8 inch).

Use the recipient's professional title (Dr., Professor, CEO) and the full company name. If you are unsure of the recipient's gender, use their full name (e.g., "Taylor Johnson") or include "Mx." as a gender-neutral title. Avoid abbreviations like "Co." unless it

Wedding Invitations

Traditional wedding etiquette requires

is part of the official name. Include a return address that matches your letterhead.

Holiday Cards and Personal Letters

These can be more relaxed. You can address the envelope to “The Johnson Family” or to individuals by first names only if you have a close relationship. However, for delivery reliability, always include the full last name and proper street address. Return addresses are still recommended.

Barcodes

Once you drop a letter in a mailbox, it enters a highly automated network. Optical character readers scan the address, look up the ZIP code, and print a barcode on the bottom right of the envelope. This barcode contains routing information. To help the machines, avoid placing stickers, logos, or graphics near the barcode area (the bottom right 4.5 inches). Also, keep the address clear of any decorative elements. If you use a label, ensure it does not peel off or curl.

Postage Placement and Stamps

Place the stamp or postage in the top-right corner. For standard letters, one stamp suffices, but heavier envelopes or unusual sizes may require additional postage. Always check with your post office or an online postage calculator to avoid undersending. If you use multiple stamps, arrange them neatly, but do not cover any part of the address or barcode area.

Knowing how to write an address on an envelope is a practical skill that combines attention to detail with a touch of etiquette. Whether you are sending a birthday card across town or a formal proposal overseas, following these guidelines ensures your mail reaches its destination efficiently.
