

Introduction: A New Frontier in Prayer

Defining Informed Intercession: More Than Just Praying Harder

The phrase **Informed Intercession George Otis** popularized describes a methodology of prayer that is built on a foundation of research and discernment. It is the opposite of praying in the dark. It is prayer that is fueled by data, history, and the leading of the Holy Spirit to address specific issues.

The Core Components of Informed Intercession

- **Research (Spiritual Mapping):** This is the investigative phase. It involves gathering information about a community's history, demographics, religious affiliations, and notable events. It can include studying local newspapers, historical records, and city council minutes to understand the spiritual trajectory of a place.
- **Identification of Strongholds:** The goal of research is not academic curiosity. It is to identify “strongholds” (2 Corinthians 10:4) – mindsets, spiritual powers, and persistent patterns of sin that have become entrenched in a community. These could be anything from a history of racial violence to a pervasive spirit of poverty or lust.
- **Strategic Prayer:** With a clear understanding of the stronghold, prayer becomes focused. Instead of praying, “Lord, bless our city,” an informed intercessor might pray, “Lord, we repent for the sin of our ancestors who participated in the slave trade on this land. We break the covenant of violence that was made, and we ask for the removal of the stronghold of division.”
- **Persistent Intercession:** Informed intercession is not a one-time event. It is a sustained campaign. Once a stronghold is identified, intercessors engage in ongoing prayer, praise, and spiritual warfare until they see evidence of breakthrough.

The Transformational Goal

The ultimate goal of this type of prayer is not just spiritual experience. It is tangible, measurable transformation. Otis's work is famous for producing the **Transformations** video series, which documents cities like Almolonga, Guatemala; Cali, Colombia; and Kiambu, Kenya. These case studies present compelling evidence of communities where informed intercession led to dramatic drops in crime, economic revival, and the restoration of social order. In Almolonga, for example, a prison was converted into a police station because there were no more prisoners. This is the fruit of informed intercession – a reformation of culture.

The Role of Spiritual Mapping in Informed Intercession

If informed intercession is the engine, then spiritual mapping is the fuel. This controversial and often misunderstood practice is central to **Informed Intercession George Otis** advocated for. Spiritual mapping is the systematic process of diagnosing the spiritual condition of a geographical area.

A Tool for Repentance

A key application of spiritual mapping within the context of **Informed Intercession George Otis** taught is the practice of **identificational repentance**. This is the act of confessing and repenting of the sins of one's ancestors and leaders on behalf of the community. The biblical basis is found in Nehemiah 9 and Daniel 9, where prophets confess the sins of their people as their own. Spiritual mapping provides the “charge sheet” – the specific list of sins that need to be repented of. By identifying the historical sin (e.g., the breaking of a treaty with a Native American tribe), modern intercessors can apologize to God and ask for the curse to be broken.

Pray over the information you have gathered. Ask the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom. Identify the “gaps” between what is and what God wants. Is there a spirit of division? A spirit of poverty? A spirit of orphanhood? Write down your findings. Create a simple prayer map.

Step 4: Engage in Strategic Prayer

Form a small intercessory group (Matthew 18:20). Use your research to guide your prayer time. Do not just pray for symptoms; pray against the root. Confess the sins of the land. Declare God's purposes for the area. Claim the territory for the Kingdom of God.

Step 5: Watch and Celebrate

Informed intercession is not a formula. It is a relationship with God for the sake of others. Watch for the results. It may not happen overnight. When you see a small change—a new business opening, a decrease in crime, a neighbor coming to faith—celebrate it. This is the fruit of your labor.

Critiques, Considerations, and a Balanced View
